## School Dog Risk Assessment

## Introduction

Digby is to be Godalming Junior's School Dog.

The value of pet 'therapy' is widely accepted as a powerful aid to stimulation and communication. Studies have shown that the presence of companion animals can improve the well-being of children and lower the rate of anxiety, simply by making the environment happier, more enjoyable and less forbidding. However, we understand, as school, that the presence of a dog on the premises is not without risk. This risk assessment is intended to identify and minimise the risks to children, staff, property and the dog.

Mrs Kate Wilkinson, visited the home of Digby's mother many times each week to ensure that the temperament of the mother was suitable for interaction with children and Digby was chosen specifically for his docile nature. Digby has been handled by Mrs. Wilkinson and her family since he was a few days old.

Digby lives with Mrs Wilkinson in her home and will be introduced to the school environment and the children gradually. The local veterinarian practice has thoroughly checked Digby for any illnesses and is responsible for his vaccination programme. There are no diseases that could be caught from Digby as he is kept up to date with immunisations including rabies and his worming treatment is in line with European vet guidelines. Both the school and vets' surgery keep a register of his annual health check.

It is accepted that interacting with animals is not appropriate for all children but that for some it has the potential to provide many positive benefits. Any parent who does not wish their child to interact with Digby is invited to inform the school of their wishes. This risk assessment will be reviewed annually and the school senior leadership team will evaluate the impact of a school dog on a regular basis.
