Our Journey to Silver!




Year 3 Book: Bogwoppit

I recommend this book because Year 4 will learn about it, and because it's an amazing book.




Year 5 Book: The Clockwork

I recommend this book because it's a great detective novel and is exciting and intriguing.


Year 6 Book: Alex Rider, Storm-
