### Summary of PPG spending 2016/17

#### Objectives in spending PPG:

- To provide an interventions teacher to work with children who are in need of personalised additional support in order to make expected progress across the year.
- To improve the school's range of literacy interventions in order to enable children to catch up with their peers in reading and writing.
- To train and provide a school Emotional Literacy Support Assistant (ELSA) to provide high quality emotional support where it is needed.
- To continue to provide a range of focused, evidence based interventions across the school where needed to ensure all vulnerable groups make progress and overcome barriers to learning.
- To provide a Home School Link Worker in order to support families and children where needed, with a focus on improving attendance, improved home/school communication and identification of pupils who made need further social and emotional support.

#### Summary of spending and actions taken for 2016-17 academic year:


A significant proportion of the pupil premium spend this year has been used towards an interventions teacher with the focus of closing the gap between the attainment and progress of disadvantaged groups and their peers.


The school has also continued to focus on offering high quality interventions so that, when needed, children have the right support to help them catch up and make progress in line with their peers.

The school has benefited from the continued support of the HSLW (Home School Link Worker) to provide additional support and guidance for children and their families, including social and emotional support which may act as a barrier to learning.

Spending has also been available for disadvantaged children to have full access to educational trips, clubs and other enrichment opportunities.
